Medals he received that evening are the Combat Infantry Bar, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Army of Occupation Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, American Campaign Medal, World War II Victor Medal, Honorable Service Lapel Button, Army Good Conduct Medal, and the Presidential Unit Citation.

Joining Keith at dinner were three other residents who were also WWII Army Veterans. Also in attendance were Congressman Pompeo's staff and Mr. DeWyke's family. There was a good turnout of veterans who work at KVH,

and also from the area VFW and American Legion Posts. Executive Director Gregg Burden and Past Vice-Chairman of the Kansas Commission on Veterans' Affairs, Jim Buterbaugh, were also present.

Veterans Services Update

Recent Changes to Veterans Services in Western Kansas

With the beginning of the new State Fiscal Year there were changes in how the Kansas Commission on Veterans Affairs Office Veteran Services Program provides assistance in the western areas of the state. Two offices consolidated operations and we opened a new office in the heart of Manhattan, an area long concentrated with military, retirees and veterans alike. Marysville, previously a KCVAO Field Office location, will now be serviced by the new Manhattan office with monthly itinerant stops. The Garden City field office officially realigned with the Ft. Dodge Field Office. Two veterans services representatives will service all 17 counties in Southwest Kansas including three full day visits to Garden City every month. When the dust finally settles we will have two fully accredited veteran services representatives (VSR's) at the field offices in Hays, Ft Dodge, Salina, and Manhattan. Additionally, we will continue to provide outstanding support with single VSR offices at Colby and Junction City. The intent of the two person offices is to have one individual in the office at all times when the office is open and the other VSR conducting itinerant/home visits and outreach functions as needed. This concept helps provide better support services to our veterans and their dependents.

Veterans Helping Veterans

We are very excited to introduce an excellent group of new VSRs that have been selected to help us become a premiere advocacy organization and give the veterans of our state the best service possible.

Ms. Judy Thompson has been on board at the Salina Field Office since April 2014. She is a transplant to Kansas originally from Akron, Ohio. Judy retired from the Army at Ft. Riley Her and husband have two children. She likes to read, walk her dogs, and play games on her tablet in her spare time. Judy is excited to have the opportunity to continue to serve veteran Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, and Marines.

Mr. Michael McWhorter is our Junction City Field Office VSR. He is a native Kansan from the Salina area. He and his wife have eight children between them. Although, at the outset some folks had reservations the NW program has enriched the community and been key to securing our property.

Through NW community members have received Storm Watch training from the Dodge City NO-AA, training in the use of the registered offender program and will receive additional training on topics such as home security, and personal safety. Coming up later this fall the Ford County Sheriff's Department, sponsored by our local NW, will conduct "Operation ID", a no cost program to mark valuable possessions and secure your home.



In the beginning, we were all amazed at the level of night time activity in our community. Most of us had the perception that we lived in a very quiet,

isolated village apart from all the bad things going on in the world around us. Turns out, the world does reach into our community after hours and we are now able to safely monitor those activities.

Staff too, has benefited from the presence of NW patrols. Especially over night shift members. In bad weather, or when they feel a bit vulnerable, NW provides secure escorts to their vehicles.

Local law enforcement is sponsors for the program and has given us a very enthusiastic endorsement to our program and our cooperation level has never been higher. All in all, the Fort Dodge Neighborhood Watch has given us a safer, more secure and happier community.
